There is potential to develop additional industry partnerships, offering students a wider range of practical experiences. By fostering collaborations with more companies and expanding internship opportunities, the employability of graduates can be enhanced through increased hands-on experience in their respective fields.

#### **Actions Taken:**

We completely agree with the suggestion and the importance of practical experience and taking this into consideration we have discussed and agreed with our Student Welfare office to participate and collaborate with additional stakeholders related to business, management and marketing expertise. This will allow us to organize and establish seminars, workshops, and field visits to enhance students' practical and employability skills and gain expert knowledge of the industry.

We have managed to come in understanding with below external stakeholders to offer their support dealing in different expertise.

- Hospitality and Service industry
- Financial and Accounting industry
- Marketing and recruitment industry

Further to enhance and support the practical experience for the interested students we have included in the programme curriculum the following elective course:

#### Internship (Annex 12)

In addition, our college will continue to enhance and enrich further industrial links and as the college will be fully committed to provide assistance, support and allowances to student welfare office establishing and maintain regular connections with our external stakeholders and the related industries to help our students and as well our graduates to explore their career opportunities.

The EEC also suggests the introduction of an arts-focused track, allowing students to select elective courses related to the arts. This initiative, without hurting the core of the program, would facilitate synergies between programmes and serve as a distinguishing feature for the institution.

#### **Actions Taken:**

We honestly appreciate this suggestion from the EEC committee to facilitate the synergies between the two programmes and we as a college along with our Academic team, do agree and are excited with the new possibilities.
